#### RESOLUTION FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF AN HONORS COLLEGE AT VIRGINIA TECH

**WHEREAS**, the University Honors Program was founded in 1968 and is about to enter its sixth decade of operation; and

**WHEREAS**, University Honors has a demonstrated record of effectiveness in fulfilling its mission to inspire and facilitate an extraordinary education for students of exceptional motivation; and

**WHEREAS**, establishment of an Honors College demonstrates Virginia Tech's commitment to high quality, rigorous, and innovative undergraduate education; and

**WHEREAS**, the creation of honors colleges at top American public universities is increasing rapidly to meet contemporary students' desires for intimate, small-college environments that have all of the advantages of diverse, world-leading research institutions; and

**WHEREAS**, research indicates that the presence of an honors college at a large public university significantly influences the application, enrollment, and retention decisions of high-achieving students; and

WHEREAS, Virginia Tech's honors program meets 16 of the 17 criteria of a "Fully Developed Honors Program" and 9 of the 13 criteria of a "Fully Developed Honors College" as specified by the National Collegiate Honors Council, including strategic design and control of honors recruitment, admissions, policies, curriculum, diploma requirements, and residential opportunities; and

**WHEREAS**, an Honors College will expand opportunities for philanthropic support from foundations and private donors; and

**WHEREAS**, an Honors College will be uniquely positioned to maximize the disciplinary depth, interdisciplinary capacities, and purpose-driven engagement that are the hallmarks of the VT-shaped student's undergraduate student experience; and

**WHEREAS**, an Honors College will be a critical contributor to the university's vision and efforts to advance as a top 100 global university by leading in the curricular innovation needed to produce scholars and leaders capable of addressing pressing economic, societal, and technological needs;

**NOW**, **THEREFORE**, **BE IT RESOLVED**, that the existing University Honors program will be superseded by the new Honors College.


